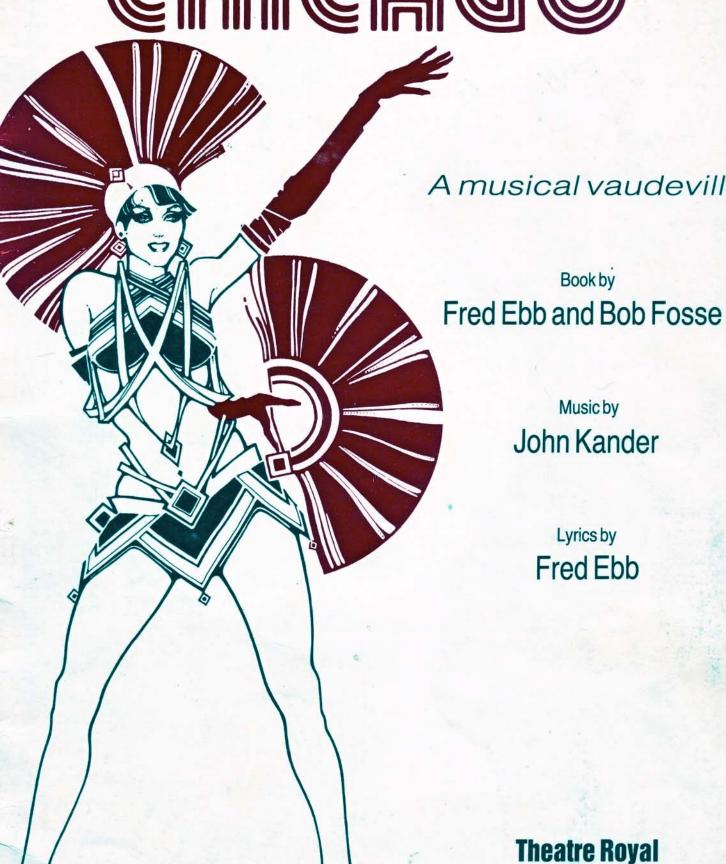


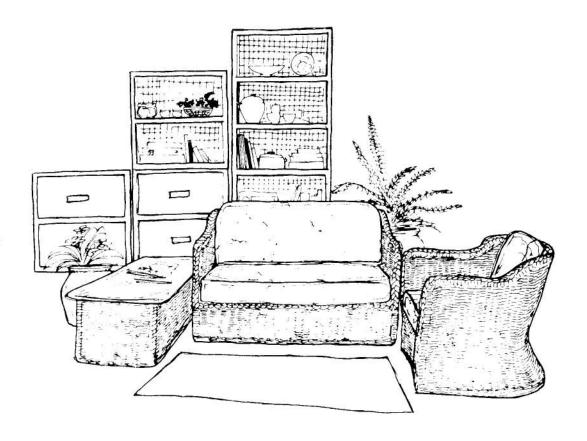

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KUCOM PRESENTS...

A succession of Kucom directors (Mel Bell, Sharyn Steller among them) talked of staging Chicago in Mackay as far back as the late 70s. The play was shelved for various reasons, most of which were to do with the logistics, the unavailability of rights and the big budget it would obviously demand.

By the beginning of 1984, Mel Bell was living in Brisbane. I was in Canberra where I had fled after directing Bell in a (successful) season of **Stop theWorld, I Want to Get Off** for Kucom at the end of 1983. Sharyn Steller was still in Mackay and by the beginning of 1984 was directing **Not Now Darling** — but still talking about **Chicago**.

Kucom went on to do **Oh What a Lovely War** (John Statham directing) and by then I had returned from my six months recuperation beside Canberra's leafy lakes, just in time to be elected President of Kucom and to direct **The Diary of Anne Frank** for a November season at the Royal.

Finally, the rights for **Chicago** became available. Sharyn Steller was directing two Menotti operas and the pressure was on to get under way with the big musical. I was here and as Mel Bell said in **Stop the World** — I was lumbered.

The cast for **Chicago** was chosen as far back as October last year and choreographer Carol Adair spent two months getting them into shape for an early January first rehearsal call. Musical director Tony Humble, with whom I had worked with **Stop the World** a year before, couldn't wait to put the score in front of **Redesign** leader Sammy Pace and his boys. The score and Sammy clicked and we never looked back. It has been a tortuous eight weeks. Most groups wouldn't take on **Cinderella** in that time, let alone this exuberant American musical.

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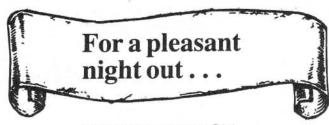
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FLESHY, BRASSY and UNABASHED!

Chicago is derived from a straight play of the same name by Maurine Dallas Watkins, written in 1924. Additionally there was a comedy movie in 1942 called **Roxie Hart**, directed by William Wellman and written by Nunnally Johnson, with Ginger Rogers in the title role and Adolphe Menjou as the lawyer.

The Broadway production of the present show opened in the summer of 1975. Its music and lyrics, which are at all times splendidly apt and sometimes quite brassily so and unabashed about it, are the work of John Kander and Fred Ebb, who served in the same capacity for **Cabaret**, and the book is a collaboration between Ebb and the redoubtable Bob Fosse, who also directed and choreographed. Chita Rivera played Velma, Gwen Verdon was Roxie (and when she took a spell she was replaced for a while by Liza Minnelli) and the lawyer was Jerry Orbach.

The Cabaret connection reminds one that a dark strain was more evident in that musical, since encroaching Nazis are bound to make an uglier impact than lethal floozies, but in its lighter way Chicago has the same sort of balance: the quirkiness, the fleshy boldness and gaudy trappings seduce us even while we recognise and deplore the corruption that goes with them.

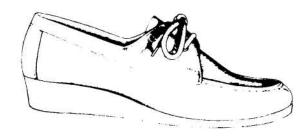

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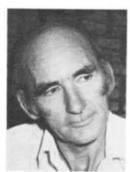
